Meet Martha Ingram

Martha Rivers Ingram, chairman of Ingram Industries Inc., was previously director of Public Affairs of the company. She is chairman of the Vanderbilt University Board of Trustees and serves on the boards of Ingram Micro, AmSouth Bancorporation, and Weyerhaeuser Company, and is a member of the advisory board of INROADS/Nashville.

Mrs. Ingram recently published *Apollo's Struggle: A Performing Arts Odyssey in the Athens of the South, Nashville, Tennessee*, a history of the arts in Nashville, as well as a study of the past, present and future of the arts in the South. In 2001, she published a family memoir entitled *E. Bronson Ingram: Complete These Unfinished Tasks of Mine*, the story of her late husband.

Also in 2001, Mrs. Ingram was named "Tennessean of the Year" by The Tennessean, a Gannett newspaper. She has received many business and leadership awards and has been inducted into the South Carolina Business Hall of Fame.

Mrs. Ingram is well known for her support and contributions to the arts community and chaired the 1996 Tennessee Bicentennial Commission. She was the guiding force behind the creation of the Tennessee Performing Arts Center

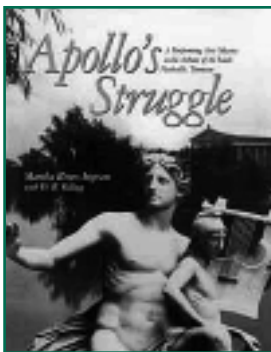


and has served as a board member for 21 years. She is currently serving as The Nashville Symphony board chair of as well as vice-chair of the campaign for the new Schermerhorn Symphony Center, future home of The Nashville Symphony.

Mrs. Ingram was a founder of the Tennessee Repertory Theatre where she serves now as a board member. She is also serving on the board of the Nashville Ballet, the Nashville Opera Association, and as a Keyboard Member for the Vanderbilt Blair School of Music. The Blair School just completed over \$23 million in new and renovated facilities including the new Martha Rivers Ingram Center for Performing Arts.

ARCHITECT JIM WILLIAMSON ELECTED TO THE AIA COLLEGE OF FELLOWS

The American Institute of Architects (AIA) has elected Memphis architect James F. Williamson of Williamson Pounders Architects to the College of Fellows. The nomination states: "Through his tireless pursuit of design excellence he has advanced the art of architecture and elevated the profession. The quality and variety of his design work in both new and preservation projects, his many awards, his teaching, and his publications are testimony to his contributions to the profession."

Williamson's work includes such well-known local projects as Ballet Memphis, restoration of the Orpheum and Immaculate Conception Cathedral, and the law offices of Burch, Porter and Johnson.

In addition to his design achievements, Williamson works to increase the awareness of the significance of architecture through teaching, lectures, and participation in significant professional forums. At Rhodes College he created the first courses in architectural theory and design, brought nationally recognized architects and critics to Memphis, and inspired over 50 promising students to pursue a career in architecture.

As chairman of an AIA Memphis task force on urban design, he has been in the forefront of the ongoing debate about the future of Memphis urban riverfront. He has been a tireless proponent of historic preservation and serves as adviser to the Memphis Chapter of the Association for Preservation of Tennessee Antiquities, the organization that runs the Woodruff-Fontaine House in Victorian Village.

Sherman; McNeal Place; The Columns, which was used as a hospital; and the First Presbyterian Church where Union General Lew Wallace, author of *Ben Hur*, worshiped regularly.

Several vendors will be demonstrating skills of the period and Evalina's Cottage on The Pillars property is selling handmade items and baked goods. Also, The Little Courthouse is offering a period clothing exhibit.

Belle Meade Plantation is proud to present the **1st Annual Juneteenth Freedom Festival** on June 18 and 19, 2005. The festival will include craft, food, performance and history. This celebration of African American history and culture began as a celebration honoring the end to slavery in Texas in 1865 and continues to this day. On June 18 tents will be constructed on the east side of the plantation near the 1830s slave cabin and 1884 dairy. A stage will be set for performances and craft booths and food vendors will line the outside of the festival area. A children's activity area will feature crafts and games related to African American history. All craft and food vendors will relate to the theme of African American history and culture. The Belle Meade staff will provide tours of the grounds, museum theater vignettes and living history at the 1830s slave cabin. Professional actors, musicians and storytellers will perform on the stage. On June 19 the theme for the day will be Community Picnic and

people will be encouraged to arrive for a picnic and listen to speeches from community leaders as well as some good music. Food vendors will be on hand but visitors may also pack their own picnic lunch.
